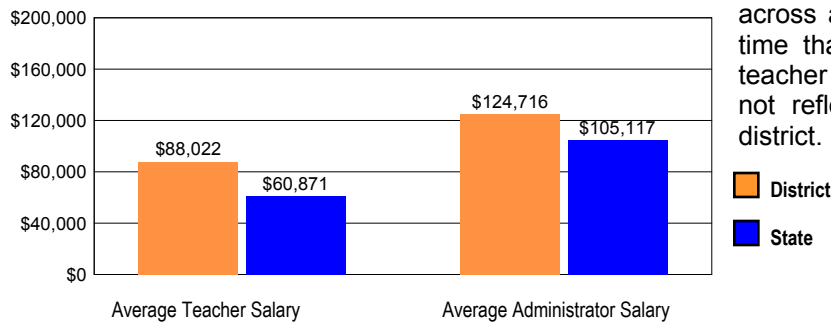

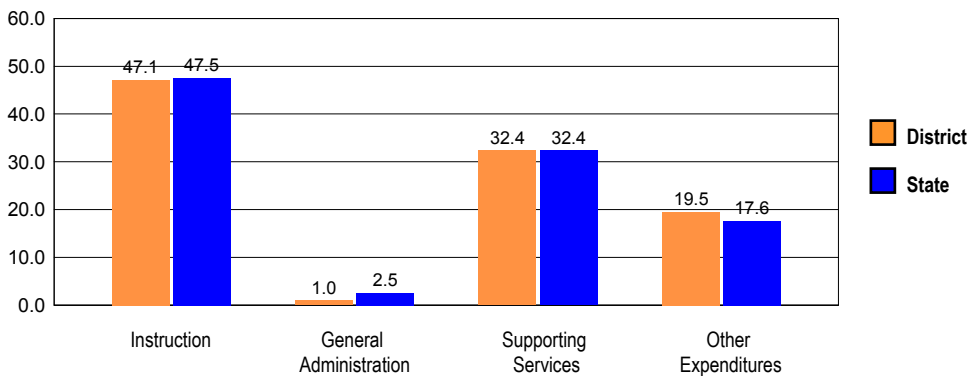

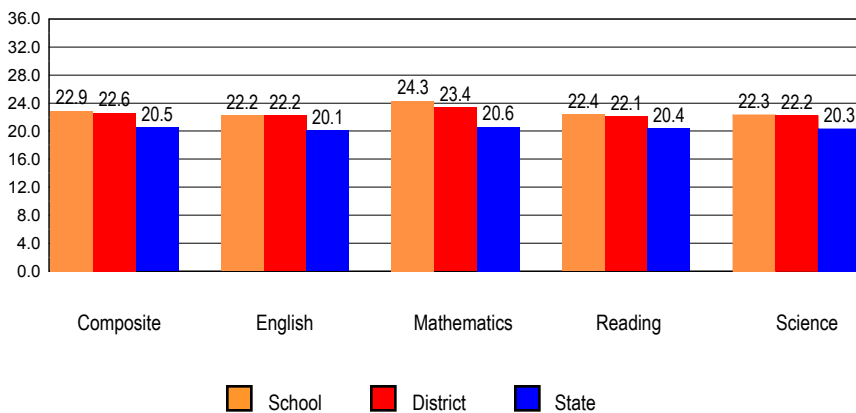

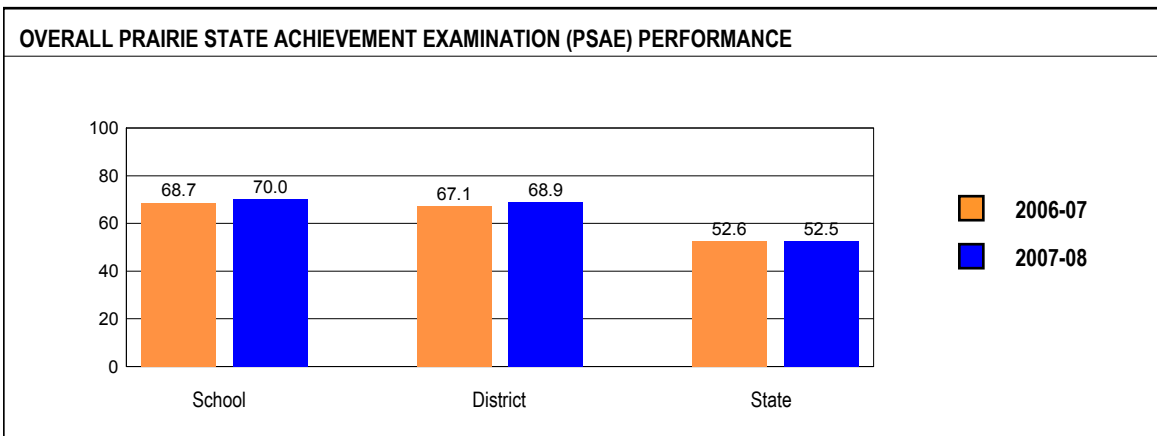
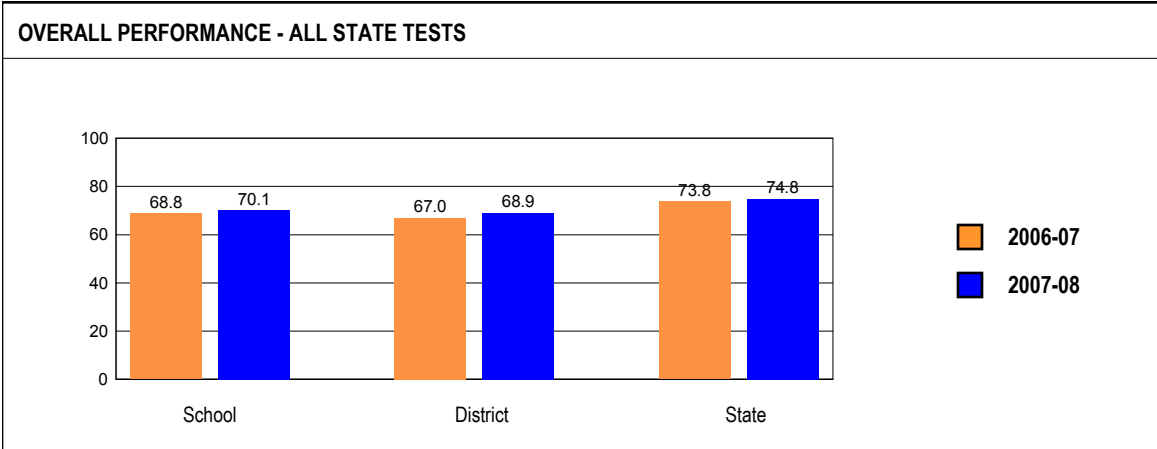

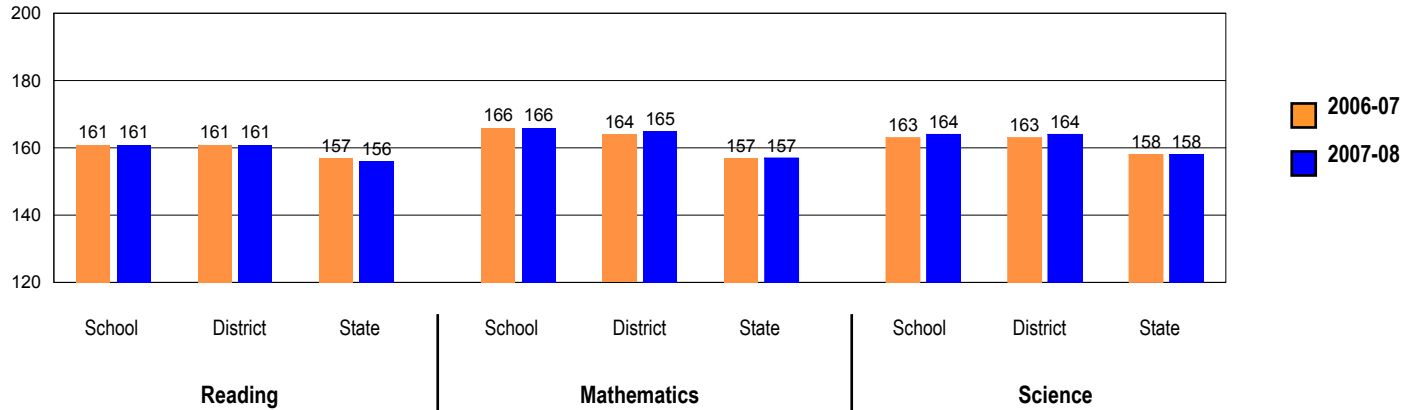

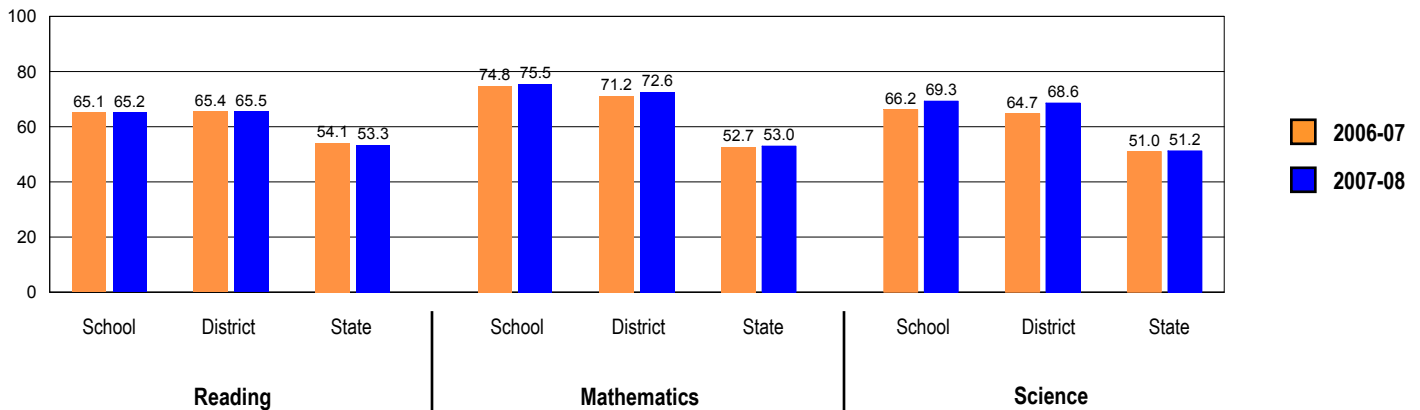

PERFORMANCE ON STATE ASSESSMENTS

Federal law requires that student achievement results for reading, mathematics, and science for schools providing Title I services be reported to the general public.

The Illinois Standards Achievement Test (ISAT) is administered to students in grades 3 through 8. The Prairie State Achievement Examination (PSAE) is administered to students in grade 11. The Illinois Alternate Assessment (IAA) is administered to students with disabilities whose Individualized Education Programs (IEPs) indicate that participation in the ISAT or PSAE would not be appropriate.

Students with disabilities have an IEP (No Child Left Behind Act). An IEP is a written plan for a child with a disability who is eligible to receive special education services under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.

Reading and Mathematics are tested in grades 3 through 8 and 11. Science is tested in grades 4, 7, and 11.

In order to protect students' identities, test data for groups of fewer than ten students are not reported.

PRAIRIE STATE ACHIEVEMENT EXAMINATION (PSAE)

The following tables show the percentages of student scores in each of four performance levels. These levels were established with the help of Illinois educators who teach the grade levels and learning areas tested. Due to rounding, the sum of the percentages in the four performance levels may not always equal 100.

Level 1 -- Academic Warning - Student work demonstrates limited knowledge and skills in the subject. Because of major gaps in learning, students apply knowledge and skills ineffectively.

Level 2 -- Below Standards - Student work demonstrates basic knowledge and skills in the subject. However, because of gaps in learning, students apply knowledge and skills in limited ways.

Level 3 -- Meets Standards - Student work demonstrates proficient knowledge and skills in the subject. Students effectively apply knowledge and skills to solve problems.

Level 4 -- Exceeds Standards - Student work demonstrates advanced knowledge and skills in the subject. Students creatively apply knowledge and skills to solve problems and evaluate the results.

James B. Conant High School Township High School District 211 School Improvement Plan Summary 2007-2008

The current School Improvement Plan addresses the requirements of the Illinois School Accountability Act as required under the federal government's "No Child Left Behind Act." The goals of each plan reflect individual school and the District needs in the areas of mathematics and reading in reference to the results of the grade 11 state-mandated assessments, including the Prairie State Achievement Examination (PSAE) and the Illinois Alternative Assessment (IAA). Action plans found in the School Improvement Plan reflect instructional changes each department has implemented based on the use of multiple data sources and best practices within the discipline.

These initiatives continue to be evaluated for academic growth based on the Critical Learning Standards and on local, state, and national assessments (such as Explore, PLAN, ACT, Measures of Academic Progress (MAP), Access, and the Classroom Reading Inventory.) The Critical Learning Standards (CLS) in reading, writing, mathematics and science define District 211's expectations for what every student should learn before graduation, regardless of program of study or personal challenges. These core standards are common across all schools in District 211 and represent the expectations of the State of Illinois and basic academic standards for success in the core areas of reading, writing, mathematics, and science. All students must successfully attain a high level of rigor in coursework if they are to meet Critical Learning Standards.

The School Improvement Plan reflects the development, implementation, and assessment of the Critical Learning Standards. Research has confirmed that increased frequency of focused assessments is necessary to modify instruction for students who are not successfully mastering course content. The conviction that all students can learn is at the core of the School Improvement Plan. Stakeholders in the District 211 community cannot be satisfied with a high percentage of student success while tolerating a level of student failure. The creation of Critical Learning Standards reaffirms a commitment to developing a pyramid of interventions for any child who does not succeed in demonstrating success in any given standard.

The School Improvement Plan proposes specific actions in response to these challenges and provides means to assess and evaluate the effectiveness of these actions.
